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
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RSTMH grant making history

- RSTMH has been providing grants for many decades
- These were originally in name of Fellows who had achieved success e.g. Dennis Burkett Fund In around 2013 – RSTMH's Board agreed to pool grants, add additional funding, and fund 16
- grants per year, including legacy grants mentioned above
- 2018 the Board and Committee decided on further changes to the Grants Programme Agreed to secure funds for Programme from partners, grow number of grants, and try to reduce RSTMH
 - costs due to annual deficit
 - Grants and Awards Committee (GAC) agreed to fund individuals rather than institutions to expand accessibility to NGOs, local government and broader disciplines; matching broad scope of RSTMH Moved from GAC reviewing applications to team of voluntary Global Assessors
- Since 2018 and the recruitment of RSTMH Ambassadors, we have seen growth in all aspects of the Programme – applications, assessments and awards
- The Programme name changed from Small Grants to Early Career Grants in 2021








Grant awardees

- 49% of awardees are female, 51% are male




Gender of awardees







- 58 are in project or programmatic roles



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Grant award research locations



Number of projects funded for highest frequency areas of health






Number of projects on top 11 areas of health

Number of research studies across world (greater than 2 studies)






Countries with highest number of research studies

Awardees from 2020 to 2022 describe the tangible outcomes achieved through their award below, showing the range of outcomes and reflecting the diversity of projects








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Outcomes in progress for awardees 2020 – 2022


Awardees from 2020 to 2022 describe the outcomes in progress, as impact often happens in the few years following the project being completed
